The Police Jury of Lincoln Parish, Louisiana, met in special session on April 25, 1961, at 9:00 a.m. at its regular meeting place in the with the following members present: John A. Mitchell, President; C. M. Mathewes, J. W. Cook, J. T. Richardson, M. A. Woodard, W. R. Sumlin, W. B. Walker, Virgil Frazier, R. M. Enloe, and J. E. Delony, L. C. Brazzel.

**Absent:** None.  
The meeting was opened with an invocation by Mr. W. B. Walker. The President stated that the purpose of the meeting was to open bids for certain items of blacktopping equipment and to transact any other business that might come before the body.

On motion of Mr. R. M. Enloe, and seconded by Mr. J. E. Delony, the following agreement was unanimously approved, this 25th day of April, 1961.

**AGREEMENT**  
WHEREAS, under the provisions of Sections 214 and 215, Title 43, Revised Statutes of the 1950 Louisiana Legislature, the Louisiana Department of Highways is authorized to enter into written agreement with parish governing authorities for the construction and/or improvement of rural, mail, and school bus routes and farm-to-market roads, under which the Department may undertake to perform all or any part of such work, or may contribute materials or funds therefor, and

WHEREAS, the Louisiana Department of Highways proposes to allocate Ninety-two thousand six hundred thirty-one and 50/100 Dollars (\$92,631.50) to finance part of the cost to improve certain roads in Lincoln Parish known as various Roads in Lincoln Parish, and

WHEREAS, the Lincoln Parish Police Jury agrees to allocate Twenty-two thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$22,000.00) to the Louisiana Department of Highways to finance the cost for improving the various Roads in Lincoln Parish, sum being a portion of the money allocated to the Parish of Lincoln under Act 128 of the Louisiana Legislature of 1955.

IT IS HEREBY AGREED, That

the Louisiana Department of Highways will perform certain construction work, as described hereunder, on certain parish roads in Lincoln Parish known as various Roads in Lincoln Parish to wit:

Blumhouse surfacing of 25.0 miles of various Roads in Lincoln Parish, total estimated cost \$146,666.50.

In addition to the \$22,000.00 from Act 128 funds, Lincoln Parish is to reimburse the Department of Highways in the amount of \$32,035.00 to apply on the cost of this project.

The above construction work shall be performed on the following terms:

1. This document constitutes the entire agreement between the Lincoln Parish Police Jury and the Louisiana Department of Highways.
2. The construction work shall be performed by District Forces under the supervision of the Louisiana Department of Highways.
3. The Lincoln Parish Police Jury agrees to contribute Twenty-two thousand Dollars (\$22,000.00) toward the cost of improving the above described parish roads, said amount shall be taken from the funds allocated to the Parish of Lincoln by the Louisiana Department of Highway under Act 128 of the Louisiana Legislature of 1955.
4. Notice to the Lincoln Parish Police Jury by mail of the completion of said work shall constitute final discharge of the obligations of the said Department of Highways under this agreement.
5. Effective on the date of the notice of completion to the said Parish by the Department of Highways, the Parish shall assume full responsibility for the maintenance of the construction work performed under this agreement.

Tips From Extension Trips

Now is the time to start your Weed Control Program. Two more result demonstrations, using Chemicals were established at Lamar Colvins and A. J. Revels. These demonstrations are made possible by your Farm Bureau Organization furnishing the material and Joe Blonid furnishing the equipment. Both of the above demonstrations are on the highway so that you may observe the results as you drive by. Last week a demonstration was established on the Paul Frazier farm with the compliments of California Chemical Company. Mr. Virgil Frazier can show you the results of demonstration on Paul's farm.

If you are in the Choudrant area there will be a spray demonstration on C. U. Butlers farm Monday morning May 22nd at 8:45 o'clock.

**CLOVER**  
Last week Dr. Walter J. Peavy visited Lincoln Parish and discussed the failure of clover with some of the pasture owners. Peavy pointed out that clover, especially White Clover has a difficult time competing with grasses for potassium.

Few of the soils in Lincoln Parish will have over sixty parts per million of potassium according to soil test. At this level the grass will use most all the potassium thus causing the clover to disappear from the pasture due to the shortage of potassium. To maintain the clover, you must add potassium over the weekend.

type of soil approximately one hundred pounds (1 pint) on its equal should be added each fall at about the time frost kills the summer grasses. This can also be furnished with five hundred pounds of 3-12-12.

Some pasture owners may still bring their clover back by fertilizing now when moisture is available.

**FIELD DAY**  
If you were not at the North Louisiana Hill Farm Station last week, you missed one of the most informative field days they have held. Possibly the items of most interest were dairy cattle being raised on top grass pasture with no supplemental feed. This can be done and the calves have about the same weight as grain fed calves, but it has to be good pasture. Another highlight was the beef cattle being wintered on different programs. Broad cows wintered on top quality Coastal Bermuda hay lost relative "little weight and had more than a ninety per cent calf crop. Cows wintered on poor hay, similar to meadow hay with no supplemental hay lost considerable weight, had about a sixty percent calf crop and had not gained back their weight at the time of the field day even though they had been on good pasture this spring.

**COTTON**  
Indications are that the growers with Cotton in 1961 are making a real business of it. Each week you hear of another individual using Chemicals for Weed Control. One dealer reports more seed being sold this year, thus indicating more acreage planted in Lincoln Parish.
