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# Simsboro Hub Of New Industry

The Village of Simsboro has become the hub of a new round of industrial development in Lincoln Parish. Since 1968, three companies have established plants in or near Simsboro, with total annual payrolls of over \$2.5 million, and plant investments totaling \$15 million.

These industries, and all local business firms, were honored at the annual ladies night banquet of the Simsboro Lions Club on Friday night.

In the keynote address at the banquet, William A. Marbury Jr., of Ruston, detailed the industrial growth of Simsboro, congratulating the community and the Lions Club for its work in development of

Laurens Glass was the first to establish, opening in May, 1968. With expansions which have been made since opening, the Laurens company now has a plant investment of \$8 million with 230 employees receiving annual payroll totaling \$1.5 million. Total sales volume at the Laurens plant is \$8.5 million, in soft drink containers, returnable and non-returnable in 612 to 30 ounce capacity. Laurens' manager, Danny House, was recognized at the meeting.
In operation since last December, the

Roberson sawmill has a plant investment of \$1 million, and now is employing 50 persons in two shifts, with annual payroll

totaling \$300,000. Locally purchased logs put another \$400,000 annually into the local economy, with estimated annual sales of the plant to run \$1.2 million. Products of the firm include hardwood lumber, sawdust, chips, and bark, marketed in the Ark-La-Tex area. The mill is owned and operated by Huey Roberson.

Duraflake South, Inc., managed by Harlan Waiker, is under construction now, with a plant investment of \$7 million projected. The plant will employ 85 to 100 persons, with annual payroll in excess of \$800,000, Sales of \$5 million annually are

The Duraflake plant will utilize plywood and sawmill waste products to be converted into wood particleboard used in furniture manufacture, floor underlay, mobile home flooring, paneling, and other products.

During the banquet, a special slide presentation was made showing all retail business firms in Simsboro, and honoring business and industry in the area.

The Lions Club presented special appreciation awards for contributions to the community's development to Ruston State Bank, Ruston State School, Laurens Glass, Roberson Lumber Co., Ruston Broiler Co., Duraflake South, Ruston Daily Leader. Krus radio, and Shreveport Times Monroe

Entrants in the regional fair had been


top winners in their individual school competitions, and winners at Grambling will go on to the State Science Fair in Natchitoches.


