A Message From JAMES D. HUNT - Exec. Vice-Pres.

The first cool breezes of fall signal the end of the traditional summer home building season. The current housing market is one of the strongest we've seen in years! This housing strength translates into very good markets for all our products, lumber, plywood and veneer!

The fall season brings the plywood export market back into sales in a big way! Our sales to Europe are off to a great start for the 1994 duty-free period. We continue to expand the export markets we sell into, opening the Japanese market and working on South Korea, as hoped for, Natalbany has broadened our ability to meet our customers needs with products such as 13/16" CDX PTS, 7/8" CDX PTS and spruce pine plywood.

A Message From A.T. HUNT, Jr. - Chairman

At this time, we find business conditions very good, both for plywood and for lumber. Continued production cutbacks in the Northwest, because of government restrictions on cutting timber, have caused a major log shortage resulting in less production of plywood and lumber. The result of continued curtailed logging in the Northwest by the Clinton Administration means rising prices for our products.

The other side of this coin is that we see continued upward pressure on logs in the South leading to higher prices for our raw material. This price increase is caused by the restrictions placed on Northwest logging and by reduced logging on U.S. Forest Service lands in the South. Prices will probably continue to rise in the future, creating a very competitive situation for plants operating in the South.

In the short run, this action by the Federal Government benefits Southern producers. But, in the long run it will hurt us with higher costs for raw materials. I have always believed that anything bad for one part, or area, of our business is eventually bad for the whole business.

The present Administration in Washington believes that the answer to all the Nation's problems can be found in Washington. Unfortunately, past experience has proven the inefficiency of government formulated solutions. We can expect further encroachment of private property rights through tougher environmental requirements. The health insurance plan will probably add to health costs overall while possibly reducing the quality of health care. And, we'll see an assault on the present labor relations laws that seem to have worked well during the past 12-15 years.

Hopefully, the Administration will not be granted all of its wishes. We do not need more government involvement with private enterprise we need less. Private enterprise is the vehicle that creates the jobs and maintains the jobs that run the country. We all must try to keep it that way.

MERVIN PARKER - Forestry Manager

All of us as employees of a forest industry need to be better informed about the facts of the timber industry. We have all heard or read half-truths and unfounded statements as to how our industry is harming the environment for future generations.

Personally, I am very proud of our industry for its stewardship and investments in our forest for the future. Hopefully, the following Louisiana Forestry facts will help you to be better informed.

Louisiana forests cover 13.8 million acres, approximately 48 percent of Louisiana's land area, making it the state's greatest single land use. Forty-seven of the state's 64 parishes contain commercial forests.

Owning these timberlands are some 113,000 owners. Sixty-two percent belongs to private non-industrial landowners, 29 percent belongs to the forest products industry and 9 percent belongs to us, the public.

Trees are Louisiana's number one crop. Forestry accounts for 65 percent of the total value of all plant commodities grown in Louisiana, including cotton, feed, grain crops, fruit, soybeans, sugarcane, etc. Raw timber is manufactured by local mills throughout Louisiana into building materials, a variety of paper products and numerous other products used in daily life. The economic value of forestry to Louisiana was almost \$4.2 billion in 1992. Louisiana forest support approximately 180 primary wood-using industries located throughout the state and 339 secondary wood-using industries. Louisiana's forest industry is the second largest manufacturing employer in the state, providing 25,000 jobs with some 8,000 additional employed in the harvesting and transportation of timber.

Louisiana's forest industry is here for the long-term, investing more than 1 billion in new equipment and plant expansion over the last five years and Louisiana landowner's are planting more than 116 million trees per year, over 27 trees for each Louisiana citizen. Take pride in being part of this industry.


A Message From GERRY BRUCIA - Lumber Sales Mgr.

There has been much talk lately about rising prices for lumber. However, a recent survey conducted by the National Association of Home Builders indicates that when builders are asked why they are unhappy with lumber prices, they are more likely to say "too volatile" than "too high". According to "Random Lengths", a lumber and plywood pricing newsletter, the average weekly change in lumber prices through August of this year was \$14.53 per thousand board feet (Mbf). This compares with \$6.83/Mbf for all of 1992. The following graph shows just how dramatic the increased volatility has become. (See graph to the right)

5/4 X 6 radius edge decking, a product that we produce at Castor is a fine example of the increasing price swings. The price on August 27th was \$770/Mbf; on September 24th, only four weeks later, it was \$650/Mbf, a drop of \$120/Mbf or \$30/Mbf per week. On October 22, four weeks later, the price rebounded to \$725/Mbf, an increase of \$75/Mbf per week.

Price volatility creates more risk for everyone in the market, including mills, builders, retailers, distributers, treaters, and remanufacturers. The causes of this volatility is a highly debated topic but fear of lumber shortages and

the volatility itself have contributed to the problem. Most segments of the lumber market would prefer to have more steady, predictable prices but it appears that this volatility is here to stay.

The USFS has decreased their timber sales to an all time low over the past several years. This decrease in the amount of timber offered for sale by the USFS is a direct result of the Red Cockaded Woodpecker. The over protection and management of this, so called, endangered species has forced Hunt Plywood Company, Inc. to extend its buying range for pine sawlogs throughout the state of Louisiana, and into Arkansas and Mississippi.

Extending the distance for which this timber must be procured has increased the cost of the raw material supplied to the Pollock Mill.

It remains extremely important to all wood using industries that the USFS continue to market wood products and increase its sales to the levels that were sold in the mid 1980's. The first step in obtaining this goal should be the contacting of our local representatives and letting them know our views concerning this subject.
